Quirindi High Represented at Lions Youth of the Year Competition

Wade will now progress to the next round of the competition, where he will represent Quirindi at the district level to be held in Quirindi next year. Message from the Relieving Principal

On Tuesday this week the student body listened to a talk given by Luke Kennedy. Luke is a published author and successful businessman in Sydney who shared his personal story with others in hopes of inspiring individuals to make positive choices.

During his presentation Luke spoke about his two selves; his true self and the self he constructed to fit the expectations of others. Luke spoke about taking actions and making poor decisions that lead to personal loss and destruction for others. His sharing of personal stories and lived experience hit home with our students who were clearly engaged throughout Luke's presentation.

Luke did not go into extensive detail about the gore and grime associated with his experiences but instead focussed on being true to yourself, focussing on what is important to your core beliefs and impressing the people who really matter. He spoke about the ability at any stage to refocus and return to your true self and that people shouldn't think that starting again is too late.

After Luke spoke with the students they were offered the opportunity to ask him questions and once again students of Quirindi High School demonstrated their ability to be thoughtful and reflective citizens. Questions included; "how did you feel when you were writing your book?", "what did it feel like when you forgave the guy who stabbed you?", "what impact did your actions have on your family?" and "did you feel bad about letting your family down?" These styles of question from our kids clearly demonstrate that they are interested in far more than a good story and that they can recognise why making good decisions is so important for an individual.

Luke's visit was made possible thanks to the partnership created by the training students received earlier in the year for Teen Mental Health First Aid. Thanks once again must go to our local community group Farming for Kids; the very generous donation made to the school earlier this year has been invaluable in providing access to structures that support mental health and well-being for all of our students.

We hosted our final Formal Assembly for 2016 on Friday during which we were able to acknowledge the participation of students in ASCA and CAPERS. Thank you to the parents and community members who joined us in celebrating the achievements of these students.

Congratulations and well wishes also to Gemma Hawkins who is performing in the signing choir at School Spectacular this weekend.

Next week is promising to be a full week with the Enrichment Class presentation evening being held on Wednesday the 2nd in the MPC at 7pm. This evening will be a showcase of students' project work and parents and friends are invited to come and help celebrate the work these students have completed through the course. On Thursday the 3rd we welcome Year 6 students for their Orientation day and invite Year 6 parents to an information evening that night. We will also be hosting our final school social on Thursday evening for all high school students.

HEALTH WARNING

WHOOPING COUGH CONFIRMED CASE AT QUIRINDI HIGH SCHOOL

Please look out for any symptoms and contact your health care professional.

There is an outbreak of whooping cough (pertussis) in NSW, mainly affecting school-aged children. Coughing spreads the infection to others nearby. Whooping cough can spread to anyone at home, including younger brothers and sisters. Whooping cough can be especially dangerous for babies. Whooping cough starts like a cold and progresses to bouts of coughing that can last for many weeks. The infection can occur even in fully-vaccinated children. Older children may just have a cough that is persistent and may be worse at night. Children with these symptoms should see a doctor. If your doctor diagnoses whooping cough in your school-aged child, please let the school know and

keep your child at home until they have taken 5 days of antibiotics. Keep coughing children away from babies.

Whooping cough vaccines give good protection against infection but immunity fades with time. Check that all your children are up to date with their vaccines, due at 6 weeks, 4 months, 6 months, 4 years and 12 years of age (offered to all Year 7 students through the NSW school-based vaccination program). A booster is also recommended at 18 months of age.

A booster dose of vaccine is also recommended for adults that are in contact with young children, such as school staff and parents. Pregnant women are recommended to have a booster dose during each pregnancy and this is funded by NSW Health. Those who are new parents or carers of babies should consult their general practitioner about appropriate immunisation.
