Last week 5 QHS athletes competed over 3 days in the CHS State Carnival held at Sydney Olympic Park, Homebush.

All athletes competed wholeheartedly and achieved some PB's. This is a monumental effort for each and every student to achieve such outstanding results at this level of competition. The dedication taken to train and travel is a testament to these individuals and their talent. Day 1 saw an action-packed day for competition full of heats and most students went onto the finals the next day. The following highlights were marked over the 3 days of tough competition: Lachlan Tydings – won gold in the 17+ discus throwing a whopping 52.06 metres.

Ashya McCrae ran a PB in the 3000 metres. Georgie Auld qualified for the 800m, and ran PB's in the 100m and 400m.

Caitlyn Etheridge qualified for the 90 and 200m hurdles and achieved PB's in the 400m and long jump.

Lacie Quigley - Bronze in the 3000m with a time of 10:30minutes, Silver in the 800m with a time of 2.17minutes followed by a Gold in the 1500m with an outstanding time of 4.45 minutes.

Congratualtions to all who qualified for the Carnival. The outcome sees both Lachlan



Tydings and Lacie Quigley proceeding to the All Schools Carnival in Week 10 from the 27th-30th September at Homebush.

The duo, who run their award-winning Hereford cattle stud on their property 'Hunday' near Borambil are hosting QHS Primary Industry students today.

The severity and duration of the current drought has led QHS Year 11 Primary Industry students and Teacher, Miss Sozou to instigate a project to assist some of our local farmers.

As the strain of the ongoing-drought continues, students headed out on-farm to assist.

"We know our farmers are doing it tough and it's terrific to be able to help today. Students are also learning a lot from Chris and Michelle on the farm and gaining practical hands-on experience," said Miss Sozou.

The first – of what is hoped to be more – of the "Sharing a hand on the land" has seen students

pull down old sheep yards, feed out Ute loads of cotton seed to livestock, sort silage wrapping waste and remove an old stock fence.

"We have achieved more today than I would have thought possible, the students have been terrific at working and it's taken a weight off our minds getting some of the bigger jobs done. We've been flat our feeding our stock and haven't been able to do many of the other farm jobs, so today has been an amazing help," said Chris.

As well as helping on-farm, the students and the Laws are enjoying meals provided by the QHS Hospitality students and teacher, Mrs Lawson. "It's been great to talk to the students about their goals for the future and what a bright future it is with them at the helm. Today has meant so much to us, not only for the on-farm help, but to have such positive and motivated people to talk to," said Chris.

Thanks also to the fundraising efforts, Bellingen High School – our Sister School – who funded the purchase of ingredients - for the QHS Hospitality students and Teacher, Mrs Lawson to prepare morning and afternoon tea and lunch for today.
