Quirindi High School year 7&8 Debate team are heading to the State Finals for the second year in a row.

The talented team placed in the top ten of the Premier's Debating Challenge to be held in Sydney in week 8, 4-6 December.

This amazing accomplishment saw the team debate their way through the zone and regional competitions to win the Regional Finals on Tuesday.

There were 410 teams who entered this competition and only 10 teams remain to head to Sydney.

The debate on Tuesday was between Quirindi (Affirmative) and Peel High School (Negative) on... 'that we should pay more to teachers when their students test results improve'.

It was an extremely close debate and the adjudicator, Mr Rob Lewis, was full of praise for the young debaters and said that the Quirindi

team had the more consistent argument on the day.

The coach of the Quirindi team, Mrs Stenner, said that she was very excited to have teams in the State Finals for two years in a row.

"The students work hard and have continued to develop their skills throughout the competition. Only one member of the team this year was a member of last year's State Finalist team so this shows the depth of debating at QHS."

THE RESILIENCE PROJECT – PARENTS PRESENTATION



The Resilience Project (TRP) will run the Liverpool Plains pilot program in 2020 for elected school including Years 7 to 10 at Quirindi High School.

Through presentations, school curriculum, teacher diaries and student journals, the TRP seeks to assist all Australians become mentally healthy.

TRP has delivered programs to over 650 government, independent and private schools nationally and is regarded as one of the most engaging positive mental health programs in the country.

The Resilience Project delivers emotionally engaging programs to schools, providing practical, evidence-based, positive mental health strategies to build resilience and happiness.

Their approach is to work with the whole school community including teachers, students and parents helping them understand the importance of practicing and implementing key strategies to build resilience and drive sustainable change.

This presentation will engage parents in the project and offer them an overview of the aims of the project.

In early 2020, participating LP schools will all receive their own student and teacher journals to implement TRP into the curriculum.

THANK YOU MR HIRD

Today is National Agriculture Day and in the spirit of the day, QHS Ag Farm Manager, Mr Hird says he has always had a passion for the industry.

Mr Hird, started working at the farm on a 6 week placement some 26 years ago.

"Mr Colin McGilchrist invited me for 6 weeks as a casual and I was here for 2 years as casual then permanent as Farm Assistant and nearly a decade ago I became the 'Farm Manager', said Mr Hird.

Nowadays the QHS Ag Farm cattle stud is named after our famed Farm Manager – 'The Hird Limousin Stud'. "It's a very rewarding job and the standard of opportunity it offers the students is fantastic. QHS has a long standing tradition of excellence in cattle leading, parading, fattening, showing, genetics and breeding of their stud cattle and we continue to do well in competition."

While the extensive drought has seen the cost of grain and hay purchases increase dramatically, Mr Hird said the support of local suppliers has been fantastic, through both donations and a stable rate in their sale price of fodder.

"We are in preparation for Wingham Beef Week 2020 and are feeding 6 steers, 8 cows and calves, 2 bulls from the cattle stud, plus the Ag farm has three 3 and 1 boar and 1 dozen laying hens. The students get so much access to the best in agricultural learning, it's a credit to the school," concluded Mr Hird. Thank you Mr Hird!
