# PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

The last 2 weeks have been busy ones for staff and students. Year 10 have been making subject selection choices for their H.S.C. years. This is an important process for students and we make every effort to give them as much guidance and support as we can. Each student attends an interview with members of the executive and teaching staff, career paths are discussed, interests focused on and selections made. We want every student to get the right advice and be able to ask as many questions as they can. The H.S.C. years are important and they help students build the pathway for their next step.

In building bespoke pathways for students, we offer an acceleration program across our junior years. Students who have demonstrated the traits of confident learners and shown a level of maturity in their learning may be offered an opportunity for acceleration. Students are identified through staff and executive discussion. If a student has been identified as having the capabilities, we offer the opportunity but ultimately it is a student and parent choice as to whether this is a pathway they believe is for them.

Year 9 have also been making their subject selections for 2021. We offer a broad range of opportunities and experiences for students. Over the years of 9 and 10, students have the opportunity to participate in 6 school designed electives. This is a great opportunity for students to decide on their area of interest ready for subject selection into year 11 and 12.

Year 8 will soon have their turn to choose electives for 2021. When Year 7 become Year 8 in 2021 they start their experience of bespoke pathways by being able to choose 1 elective. By the time they reach year 11, the only compulsory subject is English. They can then build their learning around their interests.

We always encourage students to think about life beyond school. When choosing a subject, we know that students will perform best when they select subjects they want to do as opposed to subjects they think they should do.

#### **BARISTA SISTERS**



Did you know? The original domesticated coffee plant was said to have been from Harar, and the native population is thought to be derived from Ethiopia. Coffee was primarily consumed in the Islamic world and was directly related to religious practices.

QHS Indigenous Girls Leadership Group recently had a taste of the 'World of Coffee' through a Barista Skills Development Workshop.

The group were delighted to be a part of the industry based learning day offering them skills and confidence to take into the workforce - if they choose that industry.

Head Teacher, Technology and Applied Science, Mrs Cowan presented information on many components of coffee, with students soon realising being a Barista required both skill and artistic flair.

As well as undertaking study on the origins of coffee and the history of coffee production, students were taught best practice for milk storage and use, coffee extraction and machine maintenance.

"From Arabica to Robusta, the aroma of roasted coffee beans soon filled the room as students undertook extracting their first coffee. Thank you Mrs Cowan for sharing your skills and experience - everyone learnt so much! Well done girls, you certainly whipped up some beasty expressos," said event organiser, ACLO MegO.





QHS year 12 student, Brodie Nankivell was thrilled to be a recent finalist in the 2020 NSW Training Awards for the New England Region.

Brodie, was supported in his nomination for the state award in the School Based Trainee of the Year, by his employer Soil Conservation Services (SCS) Quirindi.

"Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the presentation was held online, and while I didn't take out the top prize, I was pretty thrilled to be a finalist," he commented.

In 2018, Brodie completed two weeks of Year 10 work experience with the Soil Conservation Services, Quirindi.

Coming from a farming background, he was keen to be outdoors and work on the land, and in 2019 received a Cert II in Civil Construction Plant Operation traineeship with SSC.

In addition to the Cert II Traineeship through TAFE, the Soil Conservation Service have put Brodie through Bush Fire Awareness training (very handy this fire season) and Remote First Aid training.

In the role, Brodie has learnt the basic skills and standards of soil conservation earthworks, including surveying, work layout, construction of contour banks and dams, repairs to dams and other rehabilitation work.

"He's proven to be a valuable asset in our team, is competent with operating machines and plant and is willing to try new things and share his ideas as an innovative self-motivator, said SCS, Senior Environmental Officer, Brett Thompson.

As time has progressed in his role, Brodie has undertaken training on other plant and machinery including dump trucks, excavators, loaders and skid steers, and also in new situations, even spending some time on the north coast assisting with the construction of fire trails.

Brodie has worked on site at Walcha – during the bushfires, the Pilliga – for dam reconstruction, Iluka – on fire trails, and Dubbo - on restoration earthworks.

"The Traineeship takes a bit of getting used to compared to learning full time at school, as I move between, the school, work and TAFE for my learning. But, I knew it was the career path I wanted and I have been dedicated to achieving it," said Brodie, who will complete his Traineeship at the end of 2020 with the aim of applying for full time employment with the local SCS.

Brodie, continues to undertake study at QHS, while completing his Traineeship and is currently undertaking this Trial HSC exams.

"I've felt supported by the team at QHS, the

whole way through my schooling from year 7 to 12, which is great and would like to say thanks to QHS community and Teachers, including Careers Advisor, Ms Saunders for all the support I've had, thanks also to my peers for their encouragement, I wish you all the best with your HSC."

Brodie, said his parents, partner and his work have also really supported him and he's looking forward to the future.

"Students at QHS have the opportunity to obtain a personalised career path, by speaking to teachers and Ms Saunders, the Careers Advisor. There are lots of different options available, from University, to Apprenticeships, Traineeships and more and the school is well equipped to set you on the right path."

School Based Apprenticeships and Traineeships are a great way for students to establish themselves in the career they want whilst completing the HSC.

They combine paid work, training and school; and as well as an industry recognised national qualification students can gain credit towards the HSC. Some apprenticeships and traineeships can also contribute towards the ATAR.

# Examination Information, Rules and Procedures

- If students are aware in advance they will be absent for an examination - ensure paperwork is complete, see Mrs Craswell (Exam Co-ordinator) and notify your class teacher.
- Students have the responsibility to check the examination timetable and ensure that they know when their examinations are to be held.
- Please note that some subjects are for those studying Distance Education These are listed as DE at the end of the subject name.
- Students will bring pens, ruler, calculator, pencils, eraser, sharpener and any other necessary and NESA approved equipment. The equipment must be in a clear plastic bag.
- Students may bring water in a clear drink bottle.
- · Paper will be supplied.
- The examinations will be held at Wesley Hall.
- Students should be waiting at the back of the hall 10 minutes before the examination is due to start.
- Students are to have their mobile phones switched off in their bags.
- Electronic devices are not permitted in the examination room. This means that you must remove all devices from your person.
- All bags will be left at the back of the hall in a designated area.
- There will be five minutes reading time for most examinations.
   Specified English and Mathematics examinations will have 10 minutes reading time.
- Students must not leave the examination before the time allotted.
- Should a student need to go to the toilet, they should seek permission and they will then be escorted to the nearest toilets.
- All examination papers are to be left in the examination room.
- Students with Special Provisions (SP) will sit their examination in the QHS library at the outlined exam time.
- SPECIAL PROVISIONS Under special circumstances a student may be granted special considerations in their examinations and assessment tasks. Students who may qualify will work with the Learning and Support Teacher to complete the application process.
